HOW AN ARTS DEGREE WORKS

MAJOR

Choose at least one Honours major as your focus – or choose two to complete a double major. See page 5 for majors. You may also complete a topic specialization or intensive specialization, which involves taking four to six courses that deepen your knowledge in a specific area of your major.

REMAINING COURSES

The number of courses you'll have for a minor or electives depends on how many of your major, business and breadth courses overlap.

- > Take eight courses in one area to complete a minor. Pursuing a minor (or two) is optional and counts toward your 40 degree courses. See page 5 for minors.
- > Choose elective courses outside your major or minor to enhance your learning and build your unique degree. Electives count toward your 40 degree courses.
- The breadth requirement is made up of 10 required courses that ensure a well-rounded degree.
 Depending on the subjects you choose, these courses may count toward your major or minor.



ARTS FIRST REQUIREMENTS

Arts First is a course-based program that strengthens your communication and analytical skills. You'll take two courses to complete this requirement: one in the fall term and one in the winter term of your first year.



At St. Jerome's, we are proud to offer a variety of available scholarships and bursaries, to ensure your university education is as accessible as possible.

UPPER-YEAR Scholarships

We continue to award our high achieving students in the form of application-based upper year scholarships. These range in value from \$1000 to \$2500 – more information on these awards can be found on sju.ca/upper-year-scholarships.

BURSARIES

Bursaries are awarded based primarily on financial need.

HOW TO APPLY

Apply to St. Jerome's University on the Ontario Universities' Application Centre (OUAC) website. After you apply, you can log into Quest to view your application status, upload any required documents and, optionally, complete your Admission Information Form (AIF). The AIF lets you share more information about yourself, such as community involvement, awards, volunteering and part-time jobs, to supplement what's on your academic transcript.

RESIDENCE FEES

Residence fees are paid in two lump sums over the course of two terms. They cover all your expenses for internet, hydro, utilities and meals. By paying the fee upfront at the start of the semester, you never have to worry about budgeting for monthly rent, bills, food or laundry.
