Late Penalty for Written Assignments

All course assignments are to be handed in, on the due date, to the dropbox on Learn by 11:59 p.m. Please see the Course Schedule for the due dates for each assignment. Electronic submissions, through email attachment, will not be accepted.

All course assignments are due on a Friday. Students are expected to submit by the Friday due date, however, students will be given until the Sunday (two days after the due date) to submit without late penalty. You do not need to contact the Instructor to inform her you will be submitting by the Sunday date. After the Sunday extension date, late papers will be penalized by 5% per day, for the first four days following the Sunday extension date. After the four days the late penalty is 2% per day. Late assignments must be submitted by the day on which the assignment grading is completed and results released to the class (approximately two weeks following the submission date). After this date, incomplete assignments will receive a grade of 0%.

Extensions beyond the Sunday extension date (without late penalty) will normally be granted only to students faced with extenuating circumstances (ie. illness) and may require documentation. Requests for extensions must be made to the Professor before the due date.

Academic freedom at the University of Waterloo

Policy 33, Ethical Behaviour states, as one of its general principles (Section 1), "The University supports academic freedom for all members of the University community. Academic freedom carries with it the duty to use that freedom in a manner consistent with the scholarly obligation to base teaching and research on an honest and ethical quest for knowledge. In the context of this policy, 'academic freedom' refers to academic activities, including teaching and scholarship, as is articulated in the principles set out in the Memorandum of Agreement between the FAUW and the University of Waterloo, 1998 (Article 6). The academic environment which fosters free

debate may from time to time include the presentation or discussion of unpopular opinions or controversial material. Such material shall be dealt with as openly, respectfully and sensitively as possible." This definition is repeated in Policies 70 and 71, and in the Memorandum of Agreement, Section 6.

Intellectual Property

Students should be aware that this course contains the intellectual property of their instructor, TA, and/or St. Jerome's University. Intellectual property includes items such as:
