Course Description and Objectives

Description

An introduction to the study of law, its structure, and legal institutions from a cross-cultural and historical perspective. This interdisciplinary course examines the origins of legal systems and their impact on society. Included is an analysis of the diverse historical, political, economic, and cultural conditions under which law arises and functions within society.

This course counts as a credit towards the Legal Studies and Criminology Option and towards the Legal Studies Degree.

Objectives

This course is designed to assist students to meet the following objectives:

- Develop a theoretical understanding of how laws develop and function within society.
- Develop a critical appreciation of the manner in which our laws and courts attempt to balance individual rights vs. the public interest.
- Appreciate the study of law from a multidisciplinary perspective.
- Understand the basic principles underlying the civil and criminal justice system in Canada.
- Understand the historical development of various laws that govern Canadian society.
- Understand the role of lawyers, Crown attorneys, and judges in the interpretation and application of law within our judicial system.
- Appreciate how the Charter of Rights and Freedoms fundamentally influences the administration of the Canadian justice system.
- Locate and use scholarly resources related to the study of law, especially resources available in the library.
- Become familiar with some of the academic writing expectations and conventions students will encounter in other academic courses, especially courses in the Social Sciences.
